Preparations for the upcoming Soroti mission are underway. As of today, three out of the 14 planned steps have been completed.

- 1. Mapping the Mission Field: The mission field has been successfully mapped, identifying key areas and communities to focus on.
- 2. Envisioning the Church on Integral Mission: A clear vision for the church's role in integral mission has been established, ensuring everyone is aligned and working towards the same goal.
- 3. Forming City Zones & Training Mission Committees: City zones have been established and mission committees trained to lead and coordinate efforts in each zone.
- 4. Selecting and equipping preservation facilitators.
- 5. Whole church in prayer and fasting/mobilizing local evangelists.
- 6. School of evangelism

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Progress is being made, but there is still much work to be done. Thank you for your continued support and prayers. Further updates will be provided as preparations continue.



The Community Development Officer (CDO) of Arivu Sub County led the training session, equipping participants with the knowledge and skills to effectively advocate for child rights.

Sustainable Incomes for households


A recent follow-up visit was conducted to 7 community skilling centers to assess their current status and explore strategies for ensuring the continuity of youth skilling programs beyond the Arivu program's phase-out next year. This proactive step aims to guarantee that the valuable skills training provided to the community remains uninterrupted, empowering youth to reach their full potential and contribute to the community's growth and development.

The team will continue to work closely with the CDO to monitor the performance of the CLAs and address any child rights advocacy related issues that may arise. This ongoing partnership will ensure that the CLAs receive the support they need to sustain their advocacy efforts and create a lasting impact in promoting child protection in the community.

"ATIMAA" concept stirs entrepreneurial mindset in Arivu

In a heartwarming display of community spirit, the Top Men and Women Self Help Group (TSHG) in Uganda adopted the innovative "Atimaa" (Merry Go Round) Concept, learned from an exposure visit to Kisumu, Kenya. This concept embodies the Lugbrati word "Atimaa," meaning "support each other."

Twenty group members, led by Moses, a book writer and visionary, visited Kisumu last year. Upon his return, Moses shared the learnings with the group, and they collectively resolved to contribute Ugandan Shillings 10,500/= biweekly, in addition to their weekly savings. This bold move aimed to pool a total of 420,000/= monthly, supporting each member's business ventures.

The group's creative approach involved drawing names from a basket, randomly selecting the first beneficiary. Each member knew when their turn would come, bringing in a sense of anticipation and unity. Upon receiving the funds, members declared their family plans and objectives, ensuring transparency and accountability.

Joseph, who is also a group member, exemplifies the "Atimaa" Concept's impact. With the 420,000/= received, Joseph and his wife ventured into the produce business, capitalizing on the Democratic Republic of Congo's affordable beans. "When I joined the Top men and Women Group, I am realizing that Together, we can move far" Says Joseph. Their persistence paid off, and they opened a thriving produce store at Ullepi Trading Centre at the Congo boarder. The profits enabled Joseph to expand his business and construct his house, now at beam level.

Joseph is one of the 50 group members who are pioneering this concept in Arivu. "I tried to raise money alone but failed. Joining the Top Men and Women Group has shown me that together, we can achieve far more." The "Atimaa" Concept has not only transformed lives but also fostered a sense of community and cooperation, proving that when we support each other, we can overcome even the most daunting challenges

TEREGO CCCD PROGRAM

TEACHERS TRAINED

In partnership with Terego District Probation Office, a total of 69 teachers were trained in Child Protection Management and Safety of children. Participants were also oriented on the revised Terego District Child Protection and Gender Based Violence Referral pathway. The training targeted the Senior Women/men teachers and Head teachers.

DAY OF THE AFRICAN CHILD

The international day of the African child was commemorated with support from Terego West CCCD. A total of 156 adults (90 males, 66 female) and 116 Pupils (60 Boys, 56 Girls) attended the celebrations. The theme for the year's celebrations was "Education for Children in Africa." The time is now.

PARENTING REFRESHER TRAINING

Two refresher parenting training were conducted in Bileafe and Katrini Counties with a total of 122 male. members (60 females). The trainings served as reminder to the parents who confessed lost parenting etiquettes. The parents renewed their commitments to help their children and be supportive spouses.



FROM IDLE LAND TO THRIVING ENTERPRISE

Bacia, a 48-year-old member of the Alioatizu Savings Group's life and the lives of her loved ones is being transformed through determination and hard work. After receiving training on Income Generating Activities, Bacia took bold action and started her own commercial maize farming and poultry farming enterprise.

With a loan from BRAC and Finance Trust Bank, combined with her savings and income from her job as a supporting teaching staff at Oguvu Primary School, Bacia raised 7,000,000 Ugandan Shillings to launch her business. She utilized a 6-acre family land, previously lying idle, to plant high-yielding maize seedlings. The land, generously provided by her brother, has become a goldmine, with an expected harvest of 5 tons of maize in August 2024.

Bacia's entrepreneurial spirit and calculated risk-taking have secured a ready market for her produce, including two secondary schools and a technical institution. This guaranteed income will enable her to pay her child's university tuition fees at Makerere University, support two dependents in primary school, and provide for their basic needs.

Looking ahead, Bacia plans to build a 5-roomed permanent house within five years, solidifying her financial stability and security. Her remarkable journey serves as a testament to the power of knowledge, savings, and collective support. Bacia's story inspires us to embrace our potential, turn idle resources into opportunities, and create a brighter future for ourselves and our loved ones.




Empowering Children with Disabilities through Athletics in Kitgum District

22 children with disability that are supported by AEE participated in the Primary Schools National Kids Athletics and Special Needs Learners' (SNE) Championship games in Kitgum district. The athletes with different impairments from Mayuge district underwent a special training sessions so they could fully participate in the games. The games ranged from track and field events, adapted to meet the needs of the participants to but not limited to short put.

The children demonstrated remarkable courage and determination. For many, it was their first time competing in such an event. The smiles on their faces as they crossed the finish line, the cheers from the audience, and the sense of accomplishment were profound. It was a celebration of ability, not disability. Many of our participants achieved personal bests, breaking barriers they never thought was possible.

Participating in this event was made possible because of the combined efforts from teachers, parents, Mayuge Education Department and AEE with support from Stromme Foundation.



"I'm challenged myself, so I take away the fact that Ugandans are strong people, and that strength is really coming from the Lord Jesus", he added.

Dr. Peter was amazed at how the groups he visited were vibrant and hardworking people who are interested in each other's well-being.

"I've been amazed by the dedication of the groups who start with a seed money to help them, and then have worked diligently to make a life for themselves, to save, to share their savings with the rest of the group, and to help each other get into, realistically, a role where they can hope for a new life. A new future, whereas before it seemed that they didn't have hope for a good future", said Peter.
